On our journey, operations were expanded into Aged Care, Supported Employment, Independent Community Living, and Recreation Services.

From 2018, as 'Alinea', the Organisation's mission remains the same; to enrich the lives of people living with a disability and elders within the Western Australian community by providing contemporary and holistic services. All of the services and programs operated by Alinea have been designed to cater to the needs of the unique individual.

Golden Jubilee Raises \$100k

The Woodarburrup Cup's 50th anniversary edition raised an amazing \$100,000 for Alinea

This year marked a major milestone for one of Western Australia's most cherished grassroots fundraisers: the 50th anniversary of the Woodarburrup Cup. What began in the 1970s as a community initiative by the Dardanup Lions Club supporting the Civilian Maimed and Limbless Association (CMLA) has grown into a two-day annual tradition, no longer run by Lions, raising vital funds for Alinea (Inc), the modern successor of CMLA.

Originally held on Woodarburrup Station in WA's picturesque South West, the Cup brings locals together each year for fun, laughter, and philanthropy. Events include stockhorse racing, woodchopping, and the very popular two-up. This year's golden jubilee event was especially poignant, not only because of the incredible \$100,000 raised for Alinea, but also due to a noticeable shift in generations.

As many of the original founders have passed away and their sons are now older, grandsons

have stepped into organising roles—bringing fresh energy while honouring the legacy of those who came before. It's a reassuring sign that the spirit of the Cup is alive and well and poised to continue for another fifty years. In a touching show of commitment and curiosity, a group of Woodarburrup Cup organisers made the trip to Perth earlier this year to visit Alinea's operations. They toured Paraquad Industries at Shenton Park, and Kohl-Noor Contemporary Care in Wembley, seeing first-hand the impact of their fundraising efforts. 
ParaQuad says a 'cheerio' to its longstanding manager...

After more than 12 years of service, Joe Tuson has retired as manager of Paraguad Industries. After taking up his role in April 2013, Joe brought a steady and thoughtful leadership to PQI, drawing on decades of experience in manufacturing while embracing the challenge of a new and very different sector. Though he readily admits that the early days were tough—grappling with staffing gaps and adapting to the disability employment sector—he found deep fulfilment in building strong, compassionate teams and expanding PQI's reach. His tenure was marked by stability, low staff turnover, and a workplace culture grounded in empathy and mutual support. Productivity and purpose, in Joe's view, were not competing goals, but twin pillars of a successful enterprise.

Among his many contributions, Joe is particularly proud of the expansion of PQI's ventures—from the opening of two new Op Shops, to launching the Inter Library Loan service, the Refund Point, and most notably, the Book Bazaar. What began as a few tables in a repurposed gym has grown under his guidance into a thriving business with a monthly turnover exceeding \$30,000.

Joe brought the meticulous eye of an engineer to everything he did. A details person at heart, he managed with quiet strength, consistency, and a deep sense of support for his team. He never lost sight of our mission to support people living with a disability, ensuring that every new venture aligned with that core purpose.

NAIDOC Week @ Koh-I-Noor

Koh-I-Noor celebrates NAIDOC Week

National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC) Week is a significant event in Australia, celebrating the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and encouraging all Australians to learn, reflect, and engage with Indigenous Australia. Previously not part of the activity planner at Koh-I-Noor, this year residents were consulted, and it was unanimously decided to add it to the event calendar.

The celebration originates from a protest on Australia Day in 1938, which coincided with the 150th anniversary of the first fleet landing. Protestors marched through the streets of Sydney calling for equality in citizen and voting rights for Aboriginal people in what was one of the first civil rights protest in the world. 2025 sees NAIDOC week reach its 50th milestone with the theme of recognising the resilience and enduring strength of indigenous communities.

Event banners and indigenous artifacts were placed on display throughout the facility, and





the event was embedded into the activity planner. Brain games, reminiscence, craft, sensory and news week sessions incorporated words, language, smells, foods, knowledge, and facts about indigenous culture. Cooking sessions were built around native ingredients which brought residents from across the facility together in a cook off to prepare for a unique tasting session. This included beetroot Davidson plum and chocolate brownies, muntrie health bites, and hemp seed and muntrie cake. The lifestyle team added lemon myrtle damper, Kakadu plum, and hemp seed muntrie berry smoothies, plus kangaroo sausages and steak tasters to what was a memorable and exceptional feast at afternoon tea.

Feedback from residents and family was all positive with many enjoying the different and distinctive tastes of the native ingredients. We look forward to recognising NAIDOC week in future years and again reflecting on the parallels of enduring strength and resilience of our current resident and staff cohorts.

International Nurses Day

Koh-I-Noor celebrates Intertnational Nurses Day

There are many International Days on the World Health Organisation's annual calendar that aim to raise awareness or celebrate significant themes. One that stands out is International Nurses Day. Held every year on the anniversary of Florence Nightingales birthday, it's a time to reflect on the achievements of past and present nurses and consider the challenges for future ones. The global nursing profession faces numerous challenges, including widespread shortages, unsustainable workloads, burnout, and safety concerns. These issues are exacerbated by global health trends like ageing populations, chronic diseases, and emerging infectious diseases. Significant ethical concerns are held for the process of international recruitment with some condemning this practice as 'poaching' because local resources are being stripped with the lure of better pay and conditions.

Alinea is faced with the same challenges. Recently, the wages and opportunities for nurses in aged care have risen with hospitals





looking to aged care to fill their shortages. Staff previously seen as the 'poor cousins' to the acute sector are now actively recruited, which means that Alinea will need to compete harder and smarter for the dwindling number of qualified nurses. Koh-l-Noor currently has a team of 20 nurses who hail from Australia, the UK, Kenya, South Africa, India, Malaysia, Hong Kong, Japan, Myanmar, and Bhutan - with many of them undertaking or furthering their nursing education here in Australia. Conditions and pay rates at Koh-I-Noor have attracted team members, and the management role is to engage with these staff and make sure that morale, resources, and support are maintained and educational and career opportunities are offered so they stay with us.

While we appreciate that cake is not the biggest motivator, we served cakes on International Nurses Day (held on May 12th) to thank our nursing staff for their service.

Bayswater's oldest resident celebrates in style

Recently at Osboine Contemporary Care, staff and residents came together to mark a truly extraordinary occasion—the 103rd birthday of Inez, our oldest resident and a woman whose life story is as rich and inspiring as her years are long.

Born on 20 June 1922 in London, Inez has lived through the defining events of the 20th century and carries with her the grace, resilience, and humour of a life well lived.

A fluent speaker of both English and French, Inez served during the Second World War with the British Overseas Forces, later travelling



to France after D-Day while also raising her children.

Her nursing career spanned continents and decades, from her early days as a Queen's District Senior Nursing Sister in England to her voluntary contributions in Australia after migrating here in 1986.

"The Australian Vets made me and my exserviceman husband feel welcome," she recalls. "Some local GPs even made it possible for me to continue offering my nursing skills, building on my English registration."

Before retiring, Inez worked as a stateregistered nurse tutor and midwife, dedicating her life to caring for others.

She has also documented her incredible journey in the Three Loves Trilogy, published under the pen name of Jo Martinez.

As balloons floated above and birthday cake was shared, Inez's presence reminded everyone at Osboine that aged care is not just about years—it's about honouring the lives behind those years.

"Both countries—England and Australia—have my loyalty and love," she said with a smile.

To celebrate a 103rd birthday is rare. To celebrate a life like Inez's is a privilege.

From all of us at Alinea, we salute you, Inez.
